Tutoring, guitar, National Honor Society and lacrosse are some of the things Smith also enjoyed throughout high school.

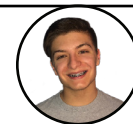
Once in college, Smith plans to remain active as she did in high school. She hopes to contribute to Penn State's THON, and join clubs to meet new people.

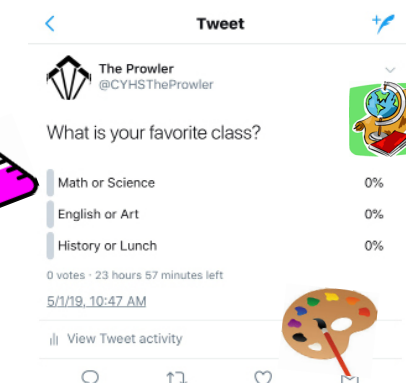
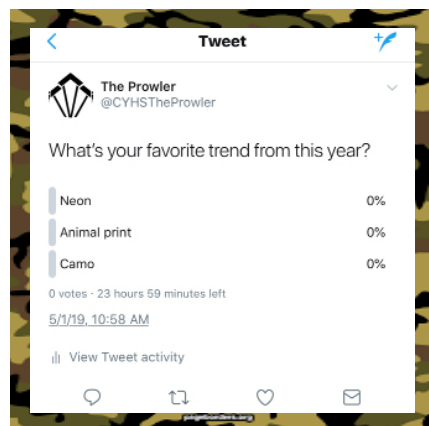

Preppy

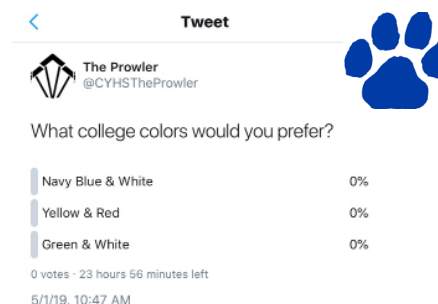

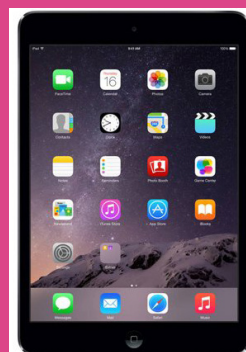
